interest ■he for entrepreneurship among young people in the Gambian has been growing in recent years, with many youth starting their own businesses. These young entrepreneurs creating employment are opportunities for many vouth and themselves thus addressing the problem of youth unemployment in the country.

In The Gambia, youth unemployment despite many initiatives and interventions by government and development partners is said to be growing at an alarming rate of 41.5%.

Young people remain the cream of the nation in terms of development and leadership. However, like in many African countries, many young people are struggling to secure a job. The transition from school to the labour market still remains challenge with opportunities such as jobs and inadequate skills. Increased employment is a development goal here in the Gambia.

The devastating effects of youth unemployment can results to poverty, irregular migration, increased crime rate and mental health problems thus called for concern that

needs to be addressed.

In addressing these challenges, the organisers of the ongoing National Youth Conference and Festival, Nayconf introduced exhibition to provide the young entrepreneurs the opportunity to display their products, network and expand their business.

Speaking to Burama Dampha, young entrepreneur operating in CRR and URR, said, he is looking forward to expanding his network by reaching out to his fellow young people to expand his business.

"If you network as an entrepreneur, you will really be able to expand your business, because the one person you are able to network here could also be a channel or network to bring you customers or possible donors," he said.

Mammy Sira Jagne, youth entrepreneur and a dealer in handy craft, fashion and design is also looking forward to network within the period, find a possible partner and collaborate to expand her business.

She used the opportunity of the interview to call on the government to patronize them and create subsidies to ease the burden of rent and taxes they struggling with.

"We want the government

to come up with youth mall at a reduced rental fee for young entrepreneurs to help us expand; create more employment for our fellow youth and boost national economy," she said.

Abdourahaman Bah, the founder of Bah Arts and Design, is another entrepreneur who believes that the Nayconf is an opportunity that he couldn't miss as the big youth convergent will help market his products.

"The Nayconf will give us the needed visibility and networking opportunity to promote our business. During the Youth Connekt a young lady contacted me from Basse ordering for one of my products so imagine that's only the youth connect with minimal number, how about the NAYCONF that brought together over 2000 young people?" she asked.

These entrepreneurs are confident that Nayconf is a good platform to network, expand and sell their products and services.

They recommended for the organizing committee to develop mechanisms that will create avenue for young entrepreneurs to network especially during Nayconf.

NAYCONF 2022 creates safe-space for women

he thirteenth edition of **NAYCONF** has created safe-space where women and girls feel physically and emotionally secured

The creation of the women and girls safe-space emerged as key strategy for the protection and empowerment of women and girls among the NAYONF delegates. The safe-space is a place where they are protected from bodily harm, including sexual abuse and preventable sport injuries.

In efforts to create a safe environment for the delegates, this vear's **NAYCONF** collaboration with Paradise Foundation created a toll free hotline where Sexual and Gender Based Violence (SGBV) cases can be reported. Mbery Jobe, member the organising committee, explained that the organising committee has also provided goody bags contending sanitary pads toothbrush and toothpaste for the ladies.

"During the previous Nayconfs was not happening, women were going out buying sanitary pads in shops but this year we have provided all the necessary materials for them. We have 500 goody bags" she said.

Madam Jobe further disclosed that they have also created a toll freeline where people can all to report anything concerning gender based violence.

"We already have four councilors who are handling the safe-space matters for the young ladies. Regarding the one 1313 hotline, we have

our partners from Paradise Foundation too," she added. Talking to Mr. **Alfusainey** Gano, another member of the

organising committee, said for the first time in Nayconf there is a gender sub-committee specifically looking at all the gender related issues and women rights in particular.

"Looking at the huge number delegates at **Nayconf** of sometimes voices are not listened to. For the first time there is a corner where when they feel they are not listened to, they can go there and make their voices heard. "This is something to celebrate because is not only SGBV being recognised."

He added the Nayconf's aim is to build the leadership skills of young people in next five-10 years to come. "The strength of Nayconf is uniting young people and for them to see each other as brothers and sisters and be each other's keepers," he stated.

Draught National Coordinator brief NAYCONF Daily

the National Youth As Conference and Festival (NAYCONF) sports activities progresses successfully in Banjul, Gibiril Martin, National Coordinator for the Draught Competition given has updates on the procedures of the cerebral game.

Meanwhile, the Nayconf sporting activities includes football, volleyball, athletics competitions, and draft. The draught is often played in various towns across the country like any other sport in The Gambia. It is also included in international competitions.

This game is played on a draught board. Draught players develop skills in the game; they must learn how to solve problems to win. Players must be able to predict the opponent's next move and must be able to pick out possible moves during every stage of play.

Mr. Martin also a specialist on draught gave a synopsis of the game in the ongoing national youth convergence. He described the draught game as a technical game that requires critical thinking and high concentration.

The draught technician said this year's Nayconf marked the 13th edition of draught tournament in the country. He recalled that





the game had started since the beginning of the biennial youth gathering 13 years ago.

"Every region has sent two participants. We have given all participants guiding principle of the game and they have read it. This was to ensure they abide by the rules and regulations of the game," he said.

According to him, all the regions have sent two participants except West Coast and the Lower River Regions which are able to produce only one participant each. "In total, we should have

14 participants but we now have 13," he disclosed.

He said the tournament is a round-robin league format that will have nine games in totality. So, this means all will play each other and then the one with the highest point will be declared winner of the tournament," he explained.

Moving forward Mr. Martin said the draught committee is looking forward to seeing this game introduce in the country's educational curriculum to ensure children learn how to play it.

He said as this game requires critical thinking it will force students into calculation and improve their performance on cunning subjects such as math and physic.

The technician lamented that certain authorities may not like to introduce this game in the country's syllabus, saying "they might say the draught is just a waste of time and not important."

Highlighting the importance of this game, he said, even international competitions often have draught games. He finally called for the game to be highly considered like any other game in the country.

We have enough food for everyone says committee chair

The chairperson for the Nayconf Food Committee, Momodou Juju Jallow has said that there is enough food for everyone attending this year's Nayconf. Chairman Jallow further assures that there will be sufficient and quality food throughout remaining days of the youth gathering.

The Nayconf Food Sub-Committee is responsible for providing feeding for the National Organising Committee (NOC), Medical Team, Security Team, and NAYCONF media team. The said committee also provides food rations to the medical and security teams to cook for themselves.

In an exclusive interview with the NAYCONF Daily, Mr.Jallow said: "There will be enough feeding for the rest of the four days, and rest assured that my team and I are doing very well in that aspect to ensure all participants under our mandate eat to their satisfaction without any problem."

Mr. Jallow revealed that the budget for feeding in the weeklong youth event is D625, 000 but was quick to add that his team is making some adjustments in the budget to avoid shortages of food thus delivering on their promised.

Nonetheless, Mr. Jallow said if need arisis they

might adjust their beget to meet the expectation of delegates they are feeding.

Meanwhile, The NAYCONF Daily has observed that there has been sufficient and quality food and water since the beginning of the national youth gathering.

In this regard, Mr. Jallow said this happens as a result of proper management and coordination of the food committee. "As a committee, we have been preparing for the Nayconf since inception and we have been discussing how to get a Nayconf with a difference this year, a Nayconf whereby all will eat to satisfaction."

He indicated that the Food Committee has been preparing for the youth

gathering over the past four months just to ensure everything concerning food during the event is done well. He said the committee does not want anyone to stay hungry.

"I think this one is a proper management and coordination by the leadership of Executive Director of the National Youth Council Alhagie Jarju and the entire NOC. They have done well. The Food Committee alone cannot do it but we are doing well because of their immense support," he said.

On Change of Diet

Mr. Jallow said the Food Committee only has some issues concerning the continuous cooking of chicken over the past few days which some people complained about. This, he noted, happened due to a delay in the delivery of fish that were promised by the Fisheries Ministry.

When asked about possible changes to the diet, he said: "We already got fish, and today we have changed the menu. We are going to eat fish today, and tomorrow we will provide you with meat. That is how we

are going to be changing the diet now."

"Until we leave this place we are not going to eat chicken again. We will only eat meat and fish," he concluded.
